
For parents registering their children for the 2022-2023 school year, please note: In order to receive the school's reduced Catholic Tuition Rate, your pastor must determine whether your family meets the criteria set by your parish for **Registered**, **Active**, **Participating members.** The definition of registered, active and participating varies by parish, but usually includes attending Mass regularly as well as contributing online or with an envelope to the offertory along with participating in the ministry life of the parish. If you have questions about your family's status, please contact the Parish Office.

Note: All Diocesan high school students receiving the reduced tuition rate for the coming year must have their status verified by their home pastor before they can be registered as Catholic.

For St. Patrick Catholic Community Parish School Verification, parishioners must be registered, active and participating members for a minimum of six months prior to submitting their form for verification. Housing Insecurity

There has been an abundance of information lately on the topic of housing insecurity. There are significant challenges for many throughout Maricopa County and



the state of Arizona who struggle to keep up with rapidly rising housing prices and rent. The Arizona State Morrison Institute for Public Policy conducted a study which was recently published regarding housing insecurity and interviewed individuals who are confronted with this topic. The housing shortage and rapidly rising rents are hurting people the most who live on the lowest incomes. Here are a few challenges and barriers that many are faced with:

Maricopa County was the fastest growing county in the U.S. in 2020. We lack approximately 150,000 rental units (luxury, affordable, and subsidized combined). Choices of rental units are limited and 97.1% of the units are occupied.

Rent: Between 2020-21, rentals jumped 25%, with average rent in greater Phoenix being \$1,477/month and some of the outlying cities like Gilbert increasing by 117% to \$1,866 average/month.

Homeownership: Single family homes increased from \$350,000 to \$450,000. An average resident in Maricopa County would have to save for more than 17 years to accrue just a 10% down payment on a home plus the negotiated percentage for closing costs.

In 2021, to afford a two-bedroom apartment in the Phoenix metro area, a worker needed to earn \$24/hour. Many of the focus group participants earn \$13-\$15 per hour. Many are prohibited from taking a second job and are faced with unaffordable child care.

Because of the lack of housing options, the trade-off is to either live in a safer and secure area that one cannot afford, or move to a more "affordable" high-crime housing area where personal or family safety may be compromised.

There are ineffective safety net "systems" like difficulty accessing the housing choice voucher program (Section 8) where waiting periods are years long and rental offices find them burdensome to navigate. Market rates have far outpaced voucher values.

A rental is considered affordable if 30% (or less) of income is spent on rent and utilities. However, the majority of low-income families in Arizona spend more than half of their income on housing costs, leaving little to no room for savings or emergencies.

Trade-offs become necessary when rent spikes and quickly becomes unaffordable. Critical expenses like child care, nutritional groceries, vehicle maintenance, car or health insurance get sacrificed.

Living Fully Awake ... by Megan Popa

This week's gospel could be easily interpreted to instill fear or get us worried about end times. The first generations of Christians lived with a deep sense of expectation, fully anticipating that Jesus would return, and thus the world would end, sometime in their lifetimes. So often the message was similar to that of today's gospel: live in vigilance, be on high alert, don't be caught asleep or unprepared! And while there's something to be learned from this message, I think today we can grasp a little deeper meaning from this idea. I love what Fr. Ronald Rolheiser has to say about being vigilant:

"Our real worry should not be that the world might suddenly end or that we might unexpectedly die, but that we might live and then die, asleep, that is, without really loving, without properly expressing our love, and without tasting deeply the real joy of living because we are so consumed by the business and busy pressures of living that we never quite get around to fully living. Hence being alert, awake, and vigilant in the biblical sense is not a matter of living in fear of the world ending or of our lives ending. Rather it is a question of having love and reconciliation as our chief concerns, of thanking, appreciating, affirming, forgiving, applogizing, and being more mindful of the joys of living in human community.

apologizing, and being more mindful of the joys of living in human community and within the sure embrace of God."

During June and July, I had the privilege of watching many parishioners fully living, offering love and compassion - awake, not just to their own lives, but to the needs of others. We participated in a program called Family Promise, in which for two weeks, we hosted various families in the House of Mercy for meals and overnight stays while they worked their way through a program that helps them move from homelessness to permanent housing and a more stable



lifestyle. I watched parishioners make delicious meals, prepared and served with love and care. I witnessed others organize games and craft projects that allowed the children to forget their current situations for a moment and just be kids. I worked with many others who did all the often unnoticed, behind the scenes work of organizing supplies, donating food and linens, or blowing up and taking down air mattresses. Basically, I witnessed exactly what Fr. Rolheiser talked about - people who stepped outside of their own busy lives and were fully awake to loving those around them.

It's easy for all of us to get caught up in the monotony and busy-ness of everyday life, to fall asleep to the needs of others, to just simply go through the motions, forgetting to love deeply, forgive generously and to give freely. Let this week's gospel be a reminder to us all that there are "Family Promise opportunities" all around us. May our prayer be that we are vigilant in being on the lookout for these opportunities and awake and willing to respond when God calls us!




