On June 24, the Supreme Court officially made a decision that addressed Roe v. Wade. Many of us were aware that a decision was coming soon. I reminded parishioners that there were going to be some issues coming that were going to be very emotional, as well as elections that are around the corner.

For myself I have learned how one might respond to parishioners and others when important events happen. Responding quickly does not

always work, as people's emotions can cause them not to hear, or be in a good place. Secondly, people who respond quickly can use information that is not accurate or has changed. So many times public media figures and others have to apologize or take back what they stated. Sometimes a quick response cannot let our best version out, and we can wound people.

On Thursday, June 30, I sent out our official response to the decision on our email connection. It was sent out again the following Thursday. It is always available on our parish website on the front page. In today's bulletin that official statement is included as well. The statement gives parishioners and others a sense of how we are responding and how we will continue to respond.

Remembering to practice charity in dealing with others, we will continue to address all life issues that the Gospel of Life calls us to lift up.

Hospitality is.....Hospitality means primarily the creation of a free space where the stranger can enter and become a friend instead of an enemy. Hospitality is not to change people but to offer them space where change can take place. It is not to bring men and women over to our side, but to offer freedom not disturbed by dividing lines. . . The paradox of hospitality is that it wants to create emptiness, not a fearful emptiness, but a friendly emptiness where strangers can enter and discover themselves as created free; free to sing their own songs, speak their own languages, dance their own dances; free also to leave and follow their own vocations. Hospitality is not a subtle invitation to adore the lifestyle of the host, but the gift of a chance for the guest to find his own.

Stewardship

In today's Gospel reading from St. Luke, we receive a reminder about the proper use of the gift of time, a fundamental aspect of a stewardship way of life. Our passage highlights one of the most famous dinner parties ever thrown, recalling the day that Martha and Mary hosted our Lord in their home. We are told that Martha, as a good steward, welcomes Christ in but then becomes "burdened with much serving" while her sister and fellow hostess chooses to simply sit with Jesus, listening to Him speak.

Martha becomes indignant at Mary's behavior and complains to Jesus, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me by myself to do the serving? Tell her to help me." But Jesus, in His infinite wisdom, refuses to get pulled into this sisterly spat. Instead, He offers Martha a fresh way to look at the situation. "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things. There is need of only one thing."

What is that one thing? It is to put Jesus first in our lives and above all other things; to "sit at his feet" and listen as Mary did, giving Him the priority of our time no matter how busy we think we are. When we truly commit to putting Christ first in our daily lives through a regular time of prayer and frequent participation in the sacraments, we will find that all our other concerns become less pressing, less overwhelming.

Why is this so? Because the time we invest in our relationship with God saturates all aspects of our lives with His grace. And because God cannot be outdone in generosity, He will abundantly reward any sacrifice we make to spend time with Him.

from the Diocese Catholic Schools Office

For parents registering their children for the 2022-2023 school year, please note: In order to receive the school's reduced Catholic Tuition Rate, your pastor must determine whether your family meets the criteria set by your parish for Registered, Active, Participating members. The definition of registered, active and participating varies by parish, but usually includes attending Mass regularly as well as contributing online or with an envelope to the offertory along with participating in the ministry life of the parish. If you have questions about your family's status, please contact the Parish Office.

Note: All Diocesan high school students receiving the reduced tuition rate for the coming year must have their status verified by their home pastor before they can be registered as Catholic.

For St. Patrick Catholic Community Parish School Verification, parishioners must be registered, active and participating members for a minimum of six months prior to submitting their form for verification. For further requirements, please contact Torri Winn at twinn@stpatcc.org.


As you begin your summer vacation planning, don't forget to plan for your Summer Giving!

Next weekend is the final weekend for our **Back to School Supply and Gift Card Drive**. School supplies go to assist St. Matthew and Roadrunner Elementary schools. The gift cards we collect will assist those children who have a parent who is incarcerated.

How many children in the U.S. have a parent that is incarcerated?

There are 2.7 million children who have a parent who is imprisoned. That's 1 in every 28 children, up from 1 in 125 just 25 years ago.

Do children always know that a parent is in prison?Not always. A study conducted revealed that a quarter of female prisoners' children did not know that their mothers were in prison. There are instances where the child is out of town, or in some cases, the child believes that the caregiver is their parent. While the intent might be to protect the child, it is argued that this causes more confusion to the child as they age. Protecting a child from the truth causes worry, uncertainty, fear, and distrust.

What might be some feelings children experience when a parent is incarcerated?

Between the ages of 2-6, children may feel separation anxiety, impaired socio-emotional development, and traumatic stress. Ages 7-10 may experience developmental regression and poor self-concept. Ages 11-14 may experience rejection on limits of behavior and trauma-reactive behaviors. Ages 15-18 may experience a premature termination of dependency relationship with a parent, and it may lead them to inter-generational crime and incarceration.

What are some emotional issues children of incarcerated parents face?

Common issues are chronic sleeplessness, difficulties concentrating, and depression. Many times this is caused by the child internalizing problems from a parent being in jail.

What is the social stigma on a child of an incarcerated parent?

Embarrassment is the most common stigma associated with this issue. Some children assume they are at fault or have done something that led to their parent's incarceration. Many times they are teased or bullied at school thus leading to low self-esteem. Others may react with anger, defiance, or a desire to retaliate against those who reject or taunt them.

Are there obstacles which hamper visiting opportunities? Yes. Many families are strained for money so it is a huge sacrifice, especially if the parent is incarcerated hours and hours away. Many times a prisoner has been moved and the family is not notified. Depending on the situation, most visits may only be done behind thick glass. Crowded visiting rooms and long wait times are also an issue. There are no guarantees a visit may actually take place once they get to the prison.


